Alison engages with each student appropriately and acknowledges their individual situation with respect and seeks to find the best solution for them. Alison is proactive in setting up what students need in terms of placement or electronic records. When I joined the university 3 years ago, and first contacted Alison, she was very welcoming, patient with my many questions, and supported me in learning the systems.

From what I have written above Alison clearly meets many of the Partnership and Student Experience criteria: strong working partnerships internally and externally; delivers outstanding service; develops strong networks across placement areas; overcoming challenges; positive engagement with students; clear focus on the student journey in the practice context; clear



responsive and personalised support; proactive in making a positive impact to student experience.

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Alison manages the clinical placements for our student midwives. She essentially takes a weight off our minds by ensuring each student is placed appropriately and can gain all the necessary experience required to register as a midwife. Many students have complex situations and their individual needs need to be taken into account. Alison accommodates students such as this with ease, furthermore her mastery over placing students appropriately ensures our programmes run smoothly. Although not a registered midwife, Alison is definitely a valued member of our team and I'm not sure that we could do her job.

I am nominating Anita Ogilvie and Andrew McKendrick for the Partnership award and the work they undertook with internal and external stakeholders to successfully plan and deliver the University's new international centre. The Edinburgh Napier University International Centre is a major university project and has involved colleagues from across the institution in its delivery (these colleagues, too many to mention in a single nomination, should also be commended). This project was strategic in its importance for the University, large in scope, complex in its delivery and delivered within a very short time frame, thanks to the efforts of Anita and Andrew who built strong relationships with internal and external stakeholders. Amongst key achievements from my perspective include the record turnaround time in securing approval from the Home Office to open the centre, which enabled the University to plan for a January 2024 intake, in addition to the necessary internal academic approvals. The efforts to navigate and prepare plans, documentation and processes have been significant and shouldn't be underestimated. They also successfully identified and delivered on the space needed to accommodate the College in Merchiston - where there are well known space bottleneck challenges - in collaboration with Schools and Services. This includes demonstrating incredible flexibility at short notice to adapt plans when circumstances changed at short notice, with the support of wider colleagues.

Prof. Jane Ali-Knight has been at the forefront of Edinburgh Napier's Festival and Event Management work for more than 20 years. Jane's work now revolves around partnerships. She creates collaborations with industry partners, develops research projects that span continents, and forges networks across the institution. Working with Jane means being introduced to a wide range of people, which opens opportunities, expands the scope and potential of projects, and leaves a legacy of stronger ties. Jane is a key figure for the Tourism subject group and its engagement with our key communities: from local festival and event producers, to government agencies and public sector bodies.

Important examples of Jane's work include the well-established "Destination Leaders' Programme", where dozens of tourism professionals have worked with Edinburgh Napier to develop their careers, ideas and, ultimately, the industry. Jane also co-leads collaborations with the British Council, which have led to numerous arts and culture professionals travelling to Edinburgh to experience the city, learn from industry leaders, and build their own connections and partnerships.

Jane sits on many boards and panels. She is Chair of the Hidden Door Festival, supporting their volunteer team to deliver one of Edinburgh's most innovative, creative and exciting festivals. Jane is also a leading figure within the British Arts Festivals Association, championing their work to engage with education, and thus benefiting the whole HE sector.

There is always an opportunity to develop academic outputs from Jane's work. She initiates, publishes and edits work on a wide range of themes, supporting colleagues and students at Napier and elsewhere to promote their interests and abilities. In recent years she has developed modules in collaboration with other Schools, benefiting students across the institution. Jane has taken students to Malawi in support of the Lake of Stars Festival, where they were given responsibility to work with the local team in delivering one of the country's premier festivals. During Covid, Jane worked with students in the Edinburgh Napier Events Society to deliver an online academic conference, that helped to maintain the community of researchers in our field.

Personally, I have a lot to be grateful to Jane for. She was my main support when I first worked for Edinburgh Napier part time in c. 2005, and then drew my attention to the opportunity to join full time in 2007. Jane has supported my research projects, putting me in touch with industry partners, editors and other supporters of my work. She was instrumental in my PhD, helping to set it up with an overseas university, and then acting as a PhD supervisor through the process.
